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COURSE DESCRIPTION AND OBJECTIVES

In the first term of Intermediate Hindi-Urdu, students will be introduced to more complex grammar in order to improve their conversational skills and ability to read and write a wider variety of texts. They will also learn the Nasta'līq script in which Urdu is most commonly written. An active participation in class and due completion of homework and exercises will be required. Contextual background about the history of Hindi-Urdu and the various contexts in which it has been used will also be discussed in class.

REQUIREMENTS

- Attendance and participation in class.
- Completion of one weekly in-class quiz.
- Completion of one midterm exam.
- Completion of one final writing assignment to be submitted during the exam period.
