
We will have some light low-carbon food available provided by Scholars.


There is some good news! Overall, greenhouse gas emissions per person in British Columbia—also called per capita—have declined since the 2007 baseline year and stabilized in recent reporting years.¹

<u>Project Drawdown</u> is a global research organization that identifies, reviews, and analyzes the most viable solutions to climate change, and shares these findings with the world. The three connected areas call for action:

1) Reduce Sources — Bringing Emissions to Zero

2) Support Sinks — Uplifting Nature's Carbon Cycle

3) Improve Society — Fostering Equality for All


Become a Sustainability Coordinator
